Curriculum and Organisation

Discussions concerning ERW Challenge Visits, pupil performance in external assessments and scrutiny reports on pupils' work, especially their response to teacher feedback, namely the learners dialogue, have taken place in meetings of the Governing Body. We have also considered the School's Self-evaluation Report and School Development Plan, transformation of the Additional Needs Provision, Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Learning developments, new GCSE specifications, the Welsh Baccalaureate, revisions to the Curriculum following the Donaldson report, Year 10 and 12 choices and a review of the school staffing structure.

Detailed information about the school curriculum is available in booklets drawn up for pupils and parents, namely the School Prospectus, 14+ Learning Pathways and 16+ Learning Pathways. In addition, an open evening for Year 6 parents is held in October, a KS4 and Sixth Form Choices Evening is held in March and a higher education seminar for Year 13 students and parents takes place in September.

During the year Governors visit school departments in turn, and also attend governor training sessions.

Language Policy

Ysgol Y Strade is a category 2A school. Welsh is the official language at Ysgol Y Strade and all subjects, with the exception of English, are taught to GCSE standard through the medium of Welsh. At present, Mathematics and Science are taught in both Welsh and English in Years 9-11.

School operates in accord with Carmarthenshire's Strategic Language Plan in order to move the school along the language continuum. Since September 2015, A Level Biology has been offered in both languages. In KS3 and KS4 Welsh-medium Science and Mathematics lessons, lists of terms and subject vocabularies are given in Welsh and English. In addition, English-medium resources, books and ICT are regularly used alongside Welsh-medium resources to enrich pupils' linguistic, scientific and mathematical development. This ensures that every pupil can discuss the subjects in both languages and dispels any fear that may exist amongst those who think that studying Science and Mathematics through the medium of Welsh may cause difficulties for pupils after they leave school. At the moment departments are preparing on-line resources to help non Welsh speaking parents to support their children, and homework and after school clubs are held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

The Welsh Language

Welsh is the official language of School for extra curricular activities and the great majority of academic lessons. School is proud of our Welsh ethos and we take steps to ensure that this is maintained for every new cohort of pupils. The pupils who choose to attend this school are encouraged to speak Welsh around school, during extra curricular activities and in those lessons that are taught through the medium of Welsh. Parents are requested to support school in this respect by encouraging their children to speak Welsh, to respect the Welshness of the school and to encourage them to to do their utmost to promote this on each and every occasion.

Policies

The Stragtegic Committee reviews school policies on a termly basis in a rolling programme, before these are adopted by the Governing Body. Ysgol Y Strade provides education in a supportive atmosphere, and strives to create an ethos that will serve as a medium to promote positive attitudes and values in a homely and secure environment.

Good discipline and rules applied in a fair and consistent manner are essential in order to safeguard order and standards within school. High standards of discipline are maintained by operating a clear disciplinary system through the use of SIMS points. School's Code of Conduct is included in the contact book, and expectations are discussed in tutorial lessons.

Pupils who break the rules are set work or must attend detention sessions. In accordance with Welsh Government guidelines, instances of serious misbehaviour can result in a period of exclusion from school. Instances of frequent misbehaviour are reported to parents.

School operates a clear policy when dealing with matters of bullying, and will respond at once if a problem of this nature should arise.

Additional Learning Needs 2016-17

School's aims and objectives state that we strive to cater for every pupil. This includes every pupil who has Additional Learning Needs (ALN).

The special educational needs can arise from a number of aspects, including: low academic achievement, high academic achievement, physical disability, psychological needs, social background, specific learning needs, anti-social behaviour.

In 2016-17, 18 pupils had statements of additional learning needs, with a number of other pupils earmarked as being in need of support. On occasion, statemented pupils are withdrawn from lessons so that they can be taught in small groups or individually. Where necessary they are also given support within the main-stream classroom environment. A number of other pupils receive specific help with reading, spelling and number during short sessions at the beginning of the school day. Some are also withdrawn from lessons for certain periods so that they can receive extra help.

A very close relationship is maintained between the Additional Learning Needs Department and other departments, as well as with external agencies e.g. the Educational Psychologist who regularly visits school.

Miss Rachel Davies, school's Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator, is responsible for planning and co-ordinating provision for pupils who have special learning needs. Statements are reviewed annually in a meeting arranged between individual parents and the county support services. Mr Vincent Lloyd is the department's link Governor. 202 pupils are listed on the ALN register, distributed as follows:

A profile has been compiled of every pupil on the ALN register, namely the OPP (One Page Profile). The OPP includes the individual pupil's opinion, the factors that affect his/her learning during lessons, the results of any standardised tests and teacher targets.

A large number of pupils included on the ALN Register ar given access arrangements to their external and internal examinations.

Able and Talented Pupils

Our primary schools share information concerning their pupils' talents with us before they reach Strade. Wide opportunities, both curricular and extrmural, are afforded across the subject range to more able and talented pupils. Achievement data and challenging targets are used to identify and challenge pupils so that they may excel.

Sports

Governors believe that School's main sporting aims have been realised, namely:

- by providing a safe environment that motivates pupils and within which they can work towards general maturity
- by developing physical skills
- by encouraging excellence
- by promoting an awareness of the importance of health when exercising.

In November a Celebration Evening 'Rewarding the Best' was held in the Stradey Park Hotel. Following an inspiring presentation by the young ambassadors and some of the sports council during the morning service, pupils were given the opportunity of voting for their 'Strade Star'.

Accessibilty Provision

The Governors are proud to announce that Ysgol y Strade's site and buildings are, and have been for some years past, accessible to pupils and adults who have a range of disabilities, and for wheelchair users. Disabled toilets are provided in the new buildings as well as a lift to the upper floors.

Provision of toilet facilities

Eight toilet locations are available to pupils, 4 for the girls and 4 for the boys. The toilet facilities are regularly checked, this being a feature of the Authority's cleaning contract. Pupils, via the work of the School Council, contribute to this work of monitoring the quality of these conveniences. We have taken action on questionnaire results by employing an on-site cleaner during the day to concentrate on keeping the toilet facilities clean.

Healthy School Scheme

Strade is a member of the National Healthy Schools Scheme and has attained Stage 4 and is aiming to attain Stage 5 this year. "A healthy school is one that succeeds in helping pupils to do their best and to build upon their successes". The school catering service fulfils the requirements of the 'Appetite for Life' scheme, and following meetings held with the School Council, over the past few years the choice of healthy options offered in the school refectory has greatly improved. The refectory and the sixth form café offer a selection of healthy snacks and drinks, a salad and fruit bar as well as a breakfast club.

All aspects of good health - emotional, mental and physical - are promoted. We promote a positive ethos where all members of the school community are important; staff members provide regular information on aspects of healthy living through the medium of PSE lessons, the BAC and specific Health Days.

Health and Safety

School's Health and Safety policy reflects the Governing Body's wish that all pupils and members of staff should receive their education and work on a secure site. All categories of staff employment are represented on the Staff Health and Safety Committee. Staff are urged to immediately report any deficiencies or perceived dangers to the Health and Safety Officer, the School Business Manager: iris@strade.sirgar.sch.uk.

School Prospectus

The School Prospectus is revised annually in order to include any changes that are required by Welsh Government and other relevant bodies. Copies are distributed to the parents of new pupils when they first join school or to those who transfer from other secondary schools. Copies are available on the school website or by email or, if a problem is encountered accessing these formats a hard copy is available, on request, from the school office.

Autumn 2012 Inspection and Post-Inspection Action Plan

School has drawn up an Action Plan in response to the chief recommendations made by the inspectors, and has made progress in each one of these recommendations as was recognised by Estyn in their post inspection visit held during February 2014. School continues to operate within these recommendations by following our School Development Plan. The Head regularly updates the Governing Body on how School is responding to these recommendations.

School Development Plan 2017-2018

School follows a Development Plan outlining the steps that are considered necessary to achieve school's main areas of improvement over the next three years. School's chief priorities include the following:

- **Target 1:** Raise standards in all the main performance indicators.
- **Target 2:** Improve the Literacy and Numeracy standards of KS3 pupils.
- **Target 3:** Develop staff in order to ensure good teaching and learning, and to aim for excellence in the classroom.
- **Target 4:** Prepare for changes to the curriculum following the Donaldson report, to include the digital competency framework.
- **Target 5:** Ensure that school lessens the deprivation gap, and raises the standards of groups of learners (FSM, LAC, B/G, MAT, ALN)
- **Target 6:** Maintain and strengthen school's relationship with stakeholders and the wider community.

Other

The Governors are proud of the wide variety of links that school maintains with the community. A number of guest speakers were once again welcomed to school as part of the Personal and Social Education course, Wirk related Education and Baccalaureate-related work.

In addition, contributions were made during the year to a number of good causes and local activities, and visits and field trips in Wales, to England and abroad were arranged.

The 5/60 Officer, the Urdd officer, the Youth Worker and the Counsellor enrich pupils' experiences across the school. School maintains a very strong relationship with PC Huw Freeman, our link policeman. PC Freeman follows the 'School Beat' Teaching Programme and prepares lessons throughout the year on contemporary themes in Key Stages 3, 4 and 5.

School policies are regularly reviewed by the Governing Body. During 2016/17 the Language policy – Promoting the Welsh Language , Teaching and Learning, Examinations, "Time off' Policy for schools were given particular attention. The Finance and Marketing Sub-Committee discussed school's budgetary matters incuding the impact of grants such as the Pupil Deprivation Grant and the financial cuts that are foreseen over the coming years. During the year the Governing Body's Buildings Sub-Committee discussed the following matters: risk assessment - vehicular traffic on the school site, health and safety, site security, maintenance matters.

School Council minutes are regularly discussed in meetings of the Governing Body, and these include healthy eating in the school refectory.

Pupil Successes

The Governors are gladdened by, and take pride in, the successes recorded by school pupils in examinations, sports, eisteddfodau, concerts, competitions, humanitarian activities and a number of other fields. It is always a pleasure to hear, whilst away form the school environment, people speaking highly of the school and of the praiseworthy behaviour of the pupils. We extend our congratulations to pupils and staff, and long may those efforts continue.
